RI President's Message: Light the path out of dark days

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n difficult times like these, it's impossible to avoid feeling heartbroken over the devastation and loss of life caused by war and destruction. Rotary always stands against harming and displacing civilian

populations and using armed aggression instead of pursuing peaceful solutions. We advocate for the observance and respect of international law.

We believe in strong action to defend and promote peace, even in the darkest of times.

But we also take our position as an international, nonpolitical, nonreligious organization seriously. To respect the global perspectives and experiences of our members, and to work most effectively in our peacebuilding efforts, we do not choose sides in conflicts.

Rotary is made up of 1.4 million people in communities all over the globe who are united in our commitment to building a peaceful world. We strive to ensure that our words and actions prioritize the health and safety of our global membership and the communities where we live and serve.

Our members seek to offer humanitarian assistance to those affected by conflict, and our global reach requires that we promote peacebuilding and conflict prevention with cross-cultural, cross-border connections and friendship through Rotary.

For decades, Rotary has harnessed these connections to carry out service projects, support peace fellowships and scholarships, and establish programs like Rotary Peace Centers to help build lasting peace. Our members also take action to promote Positive Peace, addressing the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, discrimination, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

Rotary members who wish to wage peace can use district grants and Rotary Foundation

global grants to support projects with other Rotary members that help refugees and displaced people, provide medical support, and more worldwide. Members can also work with or join peace-focused Rotary Action Groups, Friendship Exchanges, Fellowships, and intercountry committees. And District Designated Funds or district cash can support our peacebuilding and conflict prevention efforts.

Members and nonmembers alike can learn more about peacebuilding through the Rotary Positive Peace Academy, a free online course available to anyone with an internet connection. You can find it at positive-peace.academy/rotary.

There is no denying that incidents of violence and atrocities being perpetuated around the world seem to be escalating. Global peace is fragile, and the stakes are getting higher.

Still, we know that it is possible to bring all people together to work toward a shared goal. Rotary members do so every day in every part of the world. May our ability to unify in common purpose be a spark that helps light the path out of these dark days.

Together, let's Create Hope in the World.

Someone has said:

"vocational service may be the least understood of all avenues of service; and yet it is the very foundation of Rotary itself"

The introductory statement, and the second quadrant of the Object of Rotary relate to vocational service – underlying

the importance to the philosophy and culture of Rotary. The statement and the second quadrant state: "The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service; and in particular to encourage and foster [three elements]: high ethical values in business and profession; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the diginifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society.

I am especially thinking of the Boy Child Crisis that BCUP is responding to. DG Edward's Message: It is 2024, and our Finish Line is Close


y Dear Rotary Community, As we step into the dawn of a New

The Formulation-Implementation Chasm: Making strategy execution competence permeate every level, in the organization By Rtn. Daniel Katakaya Magandazi

rafting strategy holds inherent appeal, but realizing strategic visions remains an arduous undertaking, often stymied during implementation. Factors including deficient leadership commitment, lack of alignment, inertia to change, poor measurement and cultural inertia critically undermine results. While external complexities persist, addressing internal execution barriers enables unlocking unrealized value.

Bridging divides between strategic intent and outcomes requires elevating implementation capabilities across five interlinked domains: Leadership & Resources; Alignment & Accountability; Commitment & Culture; Agility & Measurement; and Discipline & Diagnostics. This facilitates the transition of strategy execution from an isolated corporate concern to an enterprise-wide organizational competency ingrained across hierarchies.

At the epicentre of activating strategy implementation stands resolute leadership dedication, serving as the galvanizing force through inspiration and strategic alignment. Visible leadership commitment assumes a dual role – providing impetus to workforce momentum through vocal advocacy and enabling alignment by backing words with strategy resonant decisions, resource allocation and role modelling.

Moreover, adequate resourcing with prudent budgetary support, skilled personnel and infrastructure lays the groundwork for implementation, and thus generating a potent catalyst for powering execution.

Next, for strategic objectives to manifest, high-level ambitions must align with ground-level execution. Cascading strategy into specific departmental and individual goals, KPIs and responsibilities synchronizes dispersed activities into a cohesive thrust. Granular translation of strategic goals into unit objectives obviates silos through a shared sense of purpose.

Defining clear responsibilities and decision rights across execution activities fosters accountability, ownership, and urgency and transparency on progress.

Thirdly, fostering workforce commitment repre-



sents a vital intangible driver. Compelling communication elucidates the strategic narrative, clarifying relevance to individual roles. This transforms strategy from an abstract concept into a concrete shared mission, securing buy-in across hierarchies, realigning organizational culture and creating an environment where behaviours, decisions and norms align with strategic demands. Dissolving silos and hierarchical

barriers catalyses knowledge flows, amplifying the impact of strategic initiatives through synergies.

Fourthly, in environments mired with unpredictability, the capacity for swift strategy adaptation assumes primacy. Sensing mechanisms provide insights to recalibrate initiatives in response to shifts. Agile execution rhythms with iterative testing, short feedback cycles and decentralized decision autonomy breed adaptiveness.

Simultaneously, performance tracking through KPIs aligned to strategic goals engenders data-driven adjustments and course corrections. Therefore, blending agility with precision measurement allows organizations to iteratively refine approach for optimal results.

And lastly, ingraining rigorous protocols fosters execution discipline, enabled through systematized workflows, progress reviews and change management structures. Assessment of deviations through root cause analyses and execution audits provides corrective insights.

Together, discipline and diagnostics create a self-learning ecosystem to implement strategies amid market turbulence. Underpinning continuous incremental improvements in execution capabilities.

In conclusion, elevating execution requires transforming implementation capabilities across multiple interlinked domains. It calls for strategic focus, open communication, decentralized empowerment, and a collaborative mindset to make implementation excellence ingrained across the organizational DNA. Without bridging this strategy of formulation vs implementation chasm, organizations risk failure to translate even the best strategic intent into desired results.

My Last DG Visit as Assistant Governor, By Rtn. Beliah Basabe

completed the DG visits to the five Clubs I am working with as AG yesterday. It was the visit to RC Saturday E Jazz at Zimbali, a restaurant on Lumumba avenue. EJazz is an On-line Club, only meeting physically on the last Saturday of the month.

I arrived on time and found some members arranging. The meeting and Club assembly started at about 6.15 pm and the room began to fill up. It was well attended. It's a very youthful Club. President Diana made her report, in her characteristic deep and confident voice.

The Club has ticked most of the boxes of half-year performance: 6 members inducted now 35 members with 22 ladies; 690 USD out of 800 target already remitted to the foundation; a community outreach in Kasenyi; a formative project to UMEA with a plan to fence off the school; all half year Dues paid to Rotary International; and several well attended resourceful meeting presentations.

I was invited to make remarks and introduce the DG. The president first made some deep thank you remarks to me. It almost threw me off balance emotionally. But I quickly composed myself... *Beera steady*. *Always*.

I chose to introduce the DG differently (after consulting him). I asked the members in the room how many knew the DG by show of hands. Then I asked each one in a few words to say how they would describe Edward Kakembo. It was very interactive and fun. These stood out: simplicity, humility, good dress sense, proud about his height (this cracked the audience but it's true), service commitment. And a committed reliable person(he is married to his High School girlfriend). The member that said this joked that he can't even remember his high school num-



bers, let alone the ages. It was fun but also a good feedback to DG about how he is perceived in his hearing.

I then commended the Club for the performance and encouraged them to further harness their on-line presence to build collaborations for service. I then Invited the DG. He spoke in his humorous, simple and mixed language way. A president that has a similar height was chatting at the back and making people

laugh and not concentrate. He invited him to the front. To stand next to him "Abasajja abampi oba mwaba ki?" This cracked all of us. He of course revised the TRF Target to 2,000 USD and the membership growth to 20. Rightly. Though I strongly feel we should insist on inducting people that are ready. Part of the problems we are facing is due to hasty inductions.

After the fellowship and the courtesies I stayed around with about 11 other Jazzers. They usually meet on line so they chose to reintroduce themselves and share what they do. Done in a very light hearted way. I was impressed with the profiles of these young people. All engaged in more than one endeavour (what they call hassles). Tree planting, farming, photography, journalism, Beauty Businesses, etc. It was enriching and enlightening for me.


As I have said before, I am getting new and different experiences from the different clubs that I am working with. Some challenging (very) some fun. But all very life enriching.
